





MAKE THIS WEEKEND YOUR HOME POOL SAFETY WEEKEND HOME POOL SAFETY CHECKLIST ELIMINATE CHILD DROWNING THIS SUMMER

40 children under the age of 5 have drowned over the last decade in WA. While all of these drowning deaths are preventable, it is the 50% that occur in home swimming pools where **your immediate action can make a difference**. Home pool fencing and effective supervision can reduce these tragic drowning deaths to zero.

Royal Life Saving WA is targeting every home pool owner with a basic reminder to check, fix and maintain their home pool and surrounding areas this summer in order to eliminate child drowning.

Disclaimer: This checklist does not substitute for a pool inspection and is for educational purposes only. Pool owners should consider getting a professional assessment of their pool's compliance.

ELECTRICITY					
 Electricity and water do not mix. A Residual Current Device (RCD) or Residual Current Circuit Breaker (RCCB) can save lives
