

Restricted Burning Period

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to section 18 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, as amended, the Shire of Northam RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD commences 1 October 2019, until midnight on 30 November 2019.

The burning of garden refuse or rubbish on the ground or in an incinerator that would otherwise be permitted under Section 24F is prohibited on all land under 2000m2 (square metres) in size during the Restricted Burning Time, without a Fire Permit issued under Regulation 15 of the Bush Fires Act 1954. (Permits will only be issued to fire brigades to conduct controlled burns on properties of this size).

Permits to burn may be obtained from the Shire of Northam website https://www.northam.wa.gov.au/services/fire-emergencymanagement/fire-permits.aspx

Failure to comply with this notice may result in a penalty being issued.

Note: Restricted and Prohibited Burning Times may be varied due to seasonal changes. Due to seasonal weather conditions, permits may not be issued in some instances or further conditions may be imposed at the discretion of a Bush Fire Control Officer

OPEN PERIOD 1 MAY – 30 SEPT	BURN PREPARE YOUR PROPERTY NOW
RESTRICTED PERIOD 1 OCT - 30 NOV	PERMIT REQUIRED
PROHIBITED PERIOD 1 DEC – 28 FEB	NO BURNING
RESTRICTED PERIOD 1 MARCH – 30 APRIL	PERMIT REQUIRED

Your responsibilities as a dog owner

Dog control Penalty: \$200 to \$5,000

If you own a dog, you have a legal responsibility to keep it under control, either within a fenced area on your property or on a leash when in public.

Dogs barking Penalty: \$200 to \$5,000

As a dog owner, you are responsible for ensuring that your dog is not creating a public nuisance by barking excessively. Nuisance barking also covers public places adjoining the premises.

Removal of dog droppings Penalty: Varies

Dog droppings are a source of annoyance to other users of footpaths and recreation areas. Most local governments have local laws that require the person in charge of the dog in a public place to remove their dog's droppings and adequately dispose of it.

Penalties for dog attacks Penalty: \$3,000 to \$20,000 Potential imprisonment

A dog attack is a very serious matter. If your dog attacks a person or another animal, you will be held responsible even if you are not there at the time.

Dog registration Penalty: \$200

A dog owner is legally required to register his or her dog with the appropriate local government if it is more than three months old. Contact your local government for a registration form and list of applicable fees.

Registration tags Penalty: \$200

Your dog is required to wear a collar to which must be attached a valid registration tag. This tag will be issued by your local government when you pay your registration fee.


Your Home

Habitable building means a dwelling, workplace, place of gathering or assembly, a building used for storage or display of goods or produce for sale by wholesale in accordance with classes 1-9 of the Building Code of Australia. The term habitable building includes attached and adjacent structures like garages, carports, verandahs or similar roofed structures that are attached to, or within 6 metres of, the dwelling or primary building.

Building Protection Zones for habitable buildings must extend a minimum of 20 metres out from any external walls of the building, attached structures or adjacent structures within 6 metres of the habitable building.

Driveways and access ways are to be a minimum of 3 metres wide with a vertical clearance of 4 metres to allow for the safe passage of a fire appliance to all buildings and assets on the land.

All grass in Building Protection Zones must be maintained to or under 5cm in height. There must be no tree crowns or branches hanging over habitable buildings. Trees are to be low pruned (or under pruned) to at least a height of 2 metres from the ground.



Community Safety Tips

Neighbourhood Watch Week runs for the first week of October each year. The Shire of Northam Community Safety Committee encourages residents to join a local Neighbourhood Watch Group. Neighbourhood Watch is simply neighbours getting to know neighbours, looking out for each other and reporting suspicious activity to Police. That is the smallest investment we ask of anyone that lives in our community.
